Epistle: Hebrews 5:1-10

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was. So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you";

as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Nicene Creed

BCP 358

The people stand as able and join in saying the Nicene Creed.

For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. Music Notes



Into thy hands is by the contemporary British composer Jonathan Dove (b. 1959). The text is by St. Edmund of Abington (1175-1240, who was Archbishop of Canterbury. The piece was commissioned by Salisbury Cathedral in celebration of 750th anniversary of the canonization of St. Edmund. The work was premiered in September 1996 by the Choir of Salisbury Cathedral in the Abbey of Pontigny, France, where St. Edmund is buried.

Super Flumina Babylonis is a setting of Psalm 137 by the 16th-century Italian master Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525-1594). After brief service at the cathedral of his hometown, Palestrina was called to St. Peter's in Rome, where he was soon appointed director of the papal choir. The rest of his life was spent in Rome, composing hundreds of masses and motets that have come to be considered perfect models of sacred music.

Adoro te devote is by St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274) and composed for the Feast of Corpus Christi. Plainsong (Gregorian chant) is the oldest music of the church, with some chants traced to the music of the synagogue.
