In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. Nicene Creed

BCP 358

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. Where's the Choir? Your choir is singing the very lovely evening service of Advent Lessons and Carols tonight at 5:00 p.m. The West Gallery and Youth Choirs will sing music by J.J. Heller, Isaac Gill, Benjamin Britten, Gerald Near and William Billings. Be still, my soul, for God is near. In candlelight and quietness, we ponder the mystery of God's constant loving pursuit of us and the advent of the promised Messiah. Please join us for this unique worship service.

Kyrie was composed by American composer and church musician, Leo Sowerby (1895 – 1968). Sowerby, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for music in 1946, was often called the "Dean of American church music." In 1927 he became organist-choirmaster at St. James Cathedral, Chicago. In 1962, after his retirement from St. James, he was called to Washington National Cathedral to become the founding director of the College of Church Musicians, a position he held until his death in 1968.

Comfort ye, my people, is a setting of today's passage from Isaiah. The original German version of the hymn was written by Johann Olearius (1611-1684) and published in his *Geistlich Sing-Kunst* in 1671. The tune *Psalm 42* first appeared in the French Psalter of 1551 with a French metric version of Psalm 42. The tune was probably composed by Louis Bourgeois (c. 1510-1561) who, under the patronage of Jean Calvin, was editor of successive editions of the Genevan Psalter from 1542 to 1551.

Dearest Lord Jesus (Liebster Herr Jesus) is a song that J. S. Bach contributed to Schemellis Gesangbuch, a collection of sacred songs published in Leipzig in 1736 by Georg Christian Schemelli.

O Adonai is from the seven "O Antiphons." The "O Antiphons" are prayers that come from the service of Vespers during the week before Christmas Eve. Each antiphon begins with "O" and addresses Jesus with a unique title which comes from the prophecies of Isaiah and Micah, and whose initials, when read backwards, form an acrostic for the Latin "Ero Cras" which means "Tomorrow I come."
