Jesus withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Many Waters is by David Marley and can be found on the CD, Spirit of Music, recorded by Ziggy Marley and the Melody Makers. The composer quotes from The Song of Solomon: "Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm; for love is strong as death, jealousy is cruel as the grave....Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it," Originally written as a love poem, this passage has been set many times as a description of the love of Christ.

Break thou the bread of life is a hymn written by Mary Artemisia Lathbury (1841-1913). Daughter of a Methodist minister, Lathbury was a writer, poet, artist and hymnist. Lathbury said that she heard a voice that she believed was God saying, "Remember, my child, that you have a gift of weaving fancies into verse and a gift with the pencil of producing visions that come to your heart; consecrate these to Me as thoroughly as you do your inmost spirit." Known as "poet laureate of Chautauqua," she wrote this hymn and "Day is Dying in the West" in 1880 for a conference at Lake Chautauqua.
