If you're visiting St. James's today, let us begin by saying WELCOME. We're delighted you've decided to join us.

St. James's is a community drawn together by our love of God and our desire to serve Christ in the world. We pray together, work together, learn, laugh, and sing together. We are eager for you to join in our worship and fellowship today.

Here are a few things that we hope will make your visit easier:

- We have nursery services available for children ages four and under on Sundays from 8:30 am until 12:30 pm. The nursery is through the brown double doors at the right front of the church.
- During the sermon at the 9 am service, we offer a Children's Chapel, where children sing, play and learn.
- During our regular programming year (September through May), there's an active adult learning and children & youth formation (aka, Sunday School) program that goes on between the services.
- You can also attend our live-streamed services at 9 and 11:15 am (or any time after) on doers.org/live. You can view a recorded version on our YouTube page.
- Many people here like to dress up for church, but we encourage you to wear what's comfortable for you. Some of us wear suits and dresses, others are more casual.
- There are restrooms downstairs from the narthex (the entrance to the church). The stairs are on the west side of the church.
- Sit where you like. There are no assigned seats.
- As for communion, if you receive communion in your home church, you're welcome to receive it at St. James's too. With some exceptions, we also offer Special Prayers and Blessings during communion. Just go to the Chapel to the left of the communion rail.
- Please fill out the Welcome Card in the pew. It will help us get to know you better.

Music Notes



Lay down your weary tune was written by Bob Dylan, the iconic American singer/songwriter, whose influence has been felt for over five decades. Written in 1963, it is considered by many as a pivotal song in Dylan's life. A music critic called it Dylan's "first withdrawal song," while a sociologist wrote that it represented a focal change "from politics to mysticism" and a theologian called it "one of the greatest theological songs since King David composed his psalms." The song contrasts the music made by nature with man-made sounds and reminds us that our creative efforts do not compare with those of Elohim, Creator God. The day before Earth Day, we offer this song as a reminder of the privilege of caring for this beautiful world.

We shall walk through the valley in peace is a setting of a traditional spiritual by Moses Hogan (1957-2003), an African-American composer and arranger of choral music best known for his very popular and accessible settings of spirituals. Hogan was a pianist, conductor, and arranger of international renown. He died at the age of 45 of a brain tumor.
