Welcome!

We're delighted you have joined us for worship today. St. James's is a community drawn together by our love of God and our desire to serve as "doers of the word," as our patron St. James wrote in his letter, and which is inscribed on our building and over our altar, too.

We especially welcome you if you are new or visiting among us. Please sit where you like, wear what you like, and join us in prayer and singing if you like. Some folks who are new to the Episcopal tradition just sit and let the beauty of our worship wash over them for a while. Some of us prefer to stand for prayers while others kneel. God is not picky about this.

If you receive communion at your home church, you're welcome to receive it at St. James's, too. We will bring communion to you in your seat if you need us to—just let one of the ushers know. After the services, one of the clergy will be in the chapel (on the left side of the sanctuary) for prayer and blessings.

There are many opportunities here for worship, education, service, and fellowship. We'd like to include you in our life together, so there is a card in your pew that you can fill out and drop in the offering plate, or hand it to one of the clergy, to let us know a little about you and what you are looking for at St. James's. We also encourage you to visit our website (www.doers.org) to learn more about us and to sign up for our eChimes weekly newsletter.

Children are an important part of our community. We do offer a nursery for infants and toddlers (four and under) but children of all ages are always welcome to be with their parents in church. After the Gospel, young children can follow the cross to the Children's Chapel (they'll return during the passing of the peace), and we invite children to come to the altar rail for a closer view during the Eucharistic prayers.

Restrooms are located downstairs from the narthex (where the front doors are). Any of our ushers will be happy to direct you.

Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the Mount of Olives, Jesus said to his disciples privately about his coming, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the



day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Music Notes

O Sapentia is from the seven "O Antiphons." The "O Antiphons" are prayers that come from the service of Vespers during the week before Christmas Eve. Each antiphon begins with "O" and addresses Jesus with a unique title which comes from the prophecies of Isaiah and Micah, and whose initials, when read backwards, form an acrostic for the Latin "Ero Cras" which means "Tomorrow I come." The titles for Christ are: O Sapientia, Wisdom (Dec.17); O Adonai, Lord (Dec. 18); O Radix Jesse, Root of Jesse (Dec. 19); O Clavis David, Key of David (Dec. 20); O Oriens, Morning Star (Dec. 21); O Rex Gentium, King of Nations (Dec. 22) and O Enmanuel, Emmanuel (Dec. 23); The seven "O Antiphons" appear in the hymn "O come, O come Emmanuel" (Hymn 56).

Wachet Auf is a setting by J. S. Bach (1685-1720) of the well-known Reformation chorale tune. The text is based in Jesus' words on a reading from the Gospel of Mark: "Keep awake — for you do not know when the master of the house will come."

Daughter of Zion is my arrangement of music from George Frideric Handel's Judas Maccabeus. The oratorio tells the story recorded in the First Book of Maccabees in the Apocrypha. I have paired the music with a text from the prophet Zephaniah.

Sunday, December 7 at 5 pm: Advent Lessons and Carols

In the season of Advent we sing, "O come, o come Emmanuel" and we await joyfully, if not impatiently, to hear the story of the baby Jesus. And yet, our hope is in His second coming. In candlelight and quietness, reflect upon the return of our Savior and the faithfulness of God. Sung by the West Gallery Choir and Youth Choir.

Sunday, December 14, at 4:30 pm: Evensong and Social Hour

Evensong is a perfect way to prepare the heart and soul for the coming week. Music by Herbert Howells and Benjamin Britten. The Rev. Blake Singer will be the Officiant. All are invited to the Social Hour that follows in Valentine Hall.

Monday, December 15, at 7 pm: Our Christmas Hope

In the midst of the preparations and festivities, some find the holidays to be

long, dark nights of the soul, full of struggle with life challenges, grief, and loss of years past and present. This service of healing prayer and reflection includes Irish carols accompanied by accordion, piano and guitar.
